Pitt in the U.K., in Poland and Saudi Arabia, all over the world."

McCullough said he and Mortensen cover Stamford, Norwalk, Wilton, Weston, Redding and Ridgefield.

Stamford, he said, has become the "in city."

"It's an extremely dynamic small city," McCullough said. "It has a lot going on, from the University of Connecticut campus here to the restaurants. It's also a great geographic location. You can catch an express train and be in Manhattan in less than an hour or you can drive three hours and be in Boston or the slope in Vermont."
